 - Thoughtful observations about the work to represent their work.
 - NOT facts found online

- How to write them. (like short captions ~1-3 sentences each

- Use a different medium for each




Step 6: - Recreation

 Recreation: answer questions about the art that would lead to a successful recreations (medium, process, tools). Ask yourself, what does the artist do to create this art? Be specific in the questions you ask yourself in order to really break in down. Use the Analysis Form that you've filled-out to guide your questions.Ask yourself about the medium, processes, and tools the artist uses.

Step 7 - Pastiche

This is the exciting part, and the greatest challenge!

 Pastiche: what's is it? Answer questions to lead to successful result (subject matter, review recreation details, what types of marks, how could you apply the artists style to your chosen image in order to successfully mimic their style, process, etc). Apply.
